

SIGNS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

For Hospitality Staff

People working in the hospitality sector, especially those working in hotels and motels, are in a unique position to spot potential signs of human trafficking. Employees working in reception, security, housekeeping and food services may have direct or indirect contact with both traffickers and their victims.

General Indicators of Both Sex and Labour Trafficking

Trafficking indicators can differ depending on the type of trafficking and a single indicator or combination does not necessarily mean that trafficking is occurring. Please consider the general context of the situation as well as patterns of behaviour.

Signs of trafficking can include:

- · Being escorted at all times; movements are being monitored
- Having someone else speak on their behalf, not having control of their identity documents, money or phone
- Showing outward signs of anxiety or fear, illness and/or abuse
- Having few or no personal items, luggage or bags
- Providing scripted or rehearsed answers to questions
- Has little awareness of their current location, date or time
- Evidence of a controlling or abusive relationship with companion(s)
- Avoids eye contact and interaction with others/hotel staff
- May decline housekeeping multiple days in a row
- Evidence of excessive noise and foot traffic in and out of room(s).
